



# CAROLINA HURRICANES 2019 DEVELOPMENT CAMP GUIDE

PNC Arena • Raleigh, NC • June 25 – June 29

**RALEIGH, NC** – The Carolina Hurricanes will host their 2019 Prospect Development Camp from June 25 to June 29.

Players will go through off-ice training and educational sessions during the week, as well as on-ice sessions at PNC Arena. Carolina's 2019 Prospect Development Camp roster consists of 26 players, including 12 forwards, seven defensemen and seven goalies. Nine players selected by the Hurricanes in the 2019 NHL Draft will attend, including first-round pick Ryan Suzuki. Nine players will also attend camp as invitees, while the remaining eight players were selected by the Hurricanes in previous drafts. The full roster is included on the last page.

All on-ice sessions are open to the media. Players will be available to the media at the conclusion of the final on-ice session each day. In addition, the on-ice sessions at 5:00 p.m. on June 26, 5:30 p.m. on June 27 and 12:00 p.m. on June 29 will be open to the public. The full on-ice schedule can be found below.

## Development Camp Notes

**Back Again** – Seven players attending this year's development camp also attended last year's camp: David Cotton, Jack Drury, Matt Filipe, Luke Henman, Lenni Killinen, Jake Kucharski and Jack LaFontaine. Eetu Makiniemi did not attend last year's camp but was present for camp in 2017.

**Welcome to Raleigh** – Nine of the Hurricanes' 12 selections from the 2019 NHL Draft will attend this year's development camp. This year's draftees attending camp include Ryan Suzuki (28th overall), Pyotr Kochetkov (36th), Jamieson Rees (44th), Patrik Puustola (73rd), Anttoni Honka (83rd), Domenick Fensore (90th), Cade Webber (99th), Kevin Wall (181st) and Blake Murray (183rd).

**Back to School** – The following NCAA programs are represented by current/former/committed players at this year's development camp: Boston College (Cotton), Boston University (Fensore, Webber), Harvard (Drury), Holy Cross (Hale), Michigan (LaFontaine, Luce), Niagara (Delmas), Northeastern (Filipe), Penn State (Wall), Providence (Kucharski) and Quinnipiac (De Jong).

**Hlinka Gretzky Cup** – Four players at this year's development camp represented their home countries at the 2018 Hlinka Gretzky Cup in Edmonton and Red Deer. Ryan Suzuki won gold with Canada, finishing third in tournament scoring with eight points (1g, 7a) in five games. Jamieson Rees also won gold with Canada, posting four points (1g, 3a) in five games during the tournament. Cade Webber registered two assists in five games playing for the United States, while Patrik Puustola tallied six points (4g, 2a) in four games for Finland.

**Making the Jump** – Two players from last year's development camp made their NHL debuts with Carolina in 2018-19. Andrei Svechnikov skated in all 82 games for the Hurricanes and posted 37 points (20g, 17a), while leading all NHL rookies in even-strength goals (20). Jake Bean made his NHL debut on Nov. 27 at Montreal and played a pair of games with Carolina.

**Starting Point** – Out of the 35 players who appeared in at least one game with Carolina in 2018-19, 20 of them attended at least one Hurricanes Development Camp: Sebastian Aho (2015), Jake Bean (2016-18), Clark Bishop (2014-15), Patrick Brown (2014), Trevor Carrick (2013-14), Phil Di Giuseppe (2012-14), Justin Faulk (2010), Haydn Fleury (2014-16), Warren Foegele (2014-17), Janne Kuokkanen (2016-17), Brock McGinn (2012-14), Martin Necas (2017-18), Alex Nedeljkovic (2016), Brett Pesce (2013-15), Victor Rask (2013), Nicolas Roy (2015-17), Jaccob Slavin (2012, 2014), Andrei Svechnikov (2018), Lucas Wallmark (2014) and Valentin Zykov (2016).

**Calder Cup Champs** – Seven players from last year's development camp played at least one game in the regular season or postseason with the Charlotte Checkers, who captured their first Calder Cup in 2018-19: Jake Bean, Michael Fora, Morgan Geekie, Jeremy Helvig, Stelio Mattheos, Martin Necas and Jesper Sellgren.

**Familiar Faces** – Camp invitees Cedrick Andree and Noel Hoefenmayer have been teammates on the OHL's Ottawa 67's for each of the last two seasons. During their time together, Ottawa has posted an 80-41-15 record, including winning the Hamilton Spectator Trophy for the OHL's best regular season record in 2018-19 (50-12-6).

**Age Gap** – Camp invitee and defenseman Noah Delmas is the oldest attendee of this year's camp (born April 29, 1996). The youngest player is Domenick Fensore (born Sept. 7, 2001).

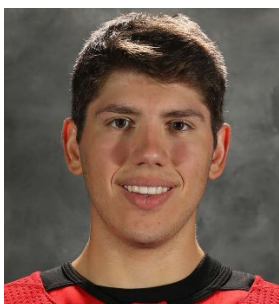
## Player Bios



**Cedrick Andree**

Goaltender (95) / 2018-19 Team: Ottawa (OHL)  
Camp Invitee

Andree posted a 34-5-4 record, 2.48 goals-against average, .910 save percentage and four shutouts in 45 appearances with the Ottawa 67's. He finished second in the OHL in goals-against average, tied for third in shutouts and fourth in wins. Andree recorded a 12-game winning streak from Sept. 30 to Nov. 7, and also won eight straight decisions from Dec. 28 to Feb. 7. The 67's won the OHL's Dave Pinkney Trophy for the lowest team goals-against average. Ottawa posted the best record in the OHL during the regular season and advanced to the OHL Finals for the first time since 2005.



**David Cotton**

Center (83) / 2018-19 Team: Boston College (HEA)  
Drafted by CAR in the sixth round, 169th overall, in the 2015 NHL Draft

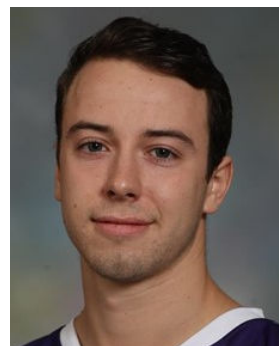
Cotton led the Boston College Eagles last season in scoring with 36 points (23g, 13a) and finished tied for second among all NCAA Division I skaters in goals. He scored the game-winning goal against UMass in the Hockey East Semifinals to send the Eagles to the Hockey East Championship game. Cotton has increased his production each year in college, registering 36 points this year after posting 28 points (9g, 19a) his sophomore year and 24 points (10g, 14a) his freshman season. He was named a Second Team All-American in 2018-19 and will captain the Eagles in 2019-20.



**Ethan De Jong**

Right Wing (82) / 2018-19 Team: Quinnipiac (ECAC)  
Camp Invitee

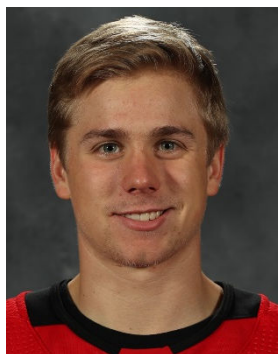
De Jong registered 25 points (10g, 25a) during his freshman season at Quinnipiac in 2018-19. He led all Bobcats rookies in points and skated in all 38 of his team's games as they advanced to the NCAA Tournament. Prior to college, De Jong tallied 95 points (22g, 73a) in 102 career games with the Prince George Spruce Kings of the British Columbia Hockey League.



**Noah Delmas**

Defenseman (94) / 2018-19 Team: Niagara (AHA)  
Camp Invitee

Delmas posted 40 points (15g, 25a) in 41 games for the Niagara Purple Eagles last season and finished fourth among all NCAA defenseman in goals and points. He has increased his production every season at Niagara, registering 40 points as a junior after posting 29 points (4g, 25a) as a sophomore and 15 (0g, 15a) as a freshman. Delmas will captain the Purple Eagles in 2019-20.



**Jack Drury**

Center (72) / 2018-19 Team: Harvard (ECAC)  
Drafted by CAR in the second round, 42nd overall, in the 2018 NHL Draft

Drury recorded 24 points (9g, 15a) in 32 games during his freshman season at Harvard in 2018-19. He posted 14 points (6g, 8a) on the man advantage as the Crimson finished with the second-best power play in Division I (28.3%). Drury won 58.2% of his faceoffs last season, and his 371 faceoff wins were the most among all Division I freshmen. He skated in seven games for the United States at the 2019 IIHF World Junior Championship, winning silver.



**Domenick Fensore**

Defenseman (89) / 2018-19 Team: U.S. NTDP  
Drafted by CAR in the third round, 90th overall, in the 2019 NHL Draft

Fensore tallied 42 points (6g, 36a) in 55 games with the U.S. National Team Development Program last season, finishing fifth on the team in assists. He represented the United States internationally at the 2019 IIHF U18 World Championship, registering four assists in seven games and winning bronze. Fensore is committed to play college hockey at Boston University.



**Matt Filipe**

Center (47) / 2018-19 Team: Northeastern (HEA)  
Drafted by CAR in the third round, 67th overall, in the 2016 NHL Draft

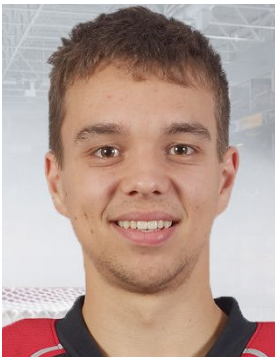
Filipe registered 19 points (8g, 11a) in 37 games with Northeastern last season, including 14 points (6g, 8a) in 24 conference games. The Huskies won their second consecutive Beanpot as well as the Hockey East Championship last season, and Filipe tallied a goal and an assist in the Hockey East Championship game. He will serve as an assistant captain for Northeastern during the 2019-20 season.



**Nick Hale**

Defenseman (41) / 2018-19 Team: Brooks (AJHL)  
Camp Invitee

Hale posted 20 points (4g, 16a) in 39 AJHL games with the Brooks Bandits in 2018-19. Prior to last season, he played three seasons of prep school hockey at Salisbury School (Conn.), where he recorded 53 points (19g, 34a) in 80 games. A native of Cary, N.C., Hale is committed to play college hockey at Holy Cross.



**Samuel Harvey**

Goaltender (49) / 2018-19 Team: Rouyn-Noranda (QMJHL)  
Camp Invitee

Harvey posted a 35-8-0 record, 2.08 goals-against average, .926 save percentage and four shutouts with Rouyn-Noranda in 2018-19. He led the Huskies to a QMJHL Championship and Memorial Cup title, and won the QMJHL's Jacques Plante Memorial Trophy (best goals-against average) for the second straight season. He was also named a QMJHL First Team All-Star in 2018-19. During the 2019 QMJHL postseason, Harvey registered a 16-4 record, 1.97 goals-against average, .924 save percentage and four shutouts.



**Luke Henman**

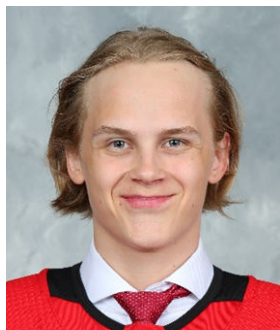
Center (52) / 2018-19 Team: Blainville-Boisbriand (QMJHL)  
Drafted by CAR in the fourth round, 96th overall, in the 2018 NHL Draft

Henman recorded 46 points (12g, 34a) in 63 games with Blainville-Boisbriand last season, leading the Armada in assists and finishing second on the team in points. He has now recorded 97 points (22g, 75a) in 130 career QMJHL regular season games and 14 points (6g, 8a) in 21 career QMJHL playoff games.



**Noel Hoefenmayer**  
Defenseman (87) / 2018-19 Team: Ottawa (OHL)  
Camp Invitee

Hoefenmayer registered 62 points (16g, 46a) for the 67's in 2018-19, finishing fourth among all OHL defensemen in points. Ottawa finished with the best record in the OHL during the regular season and advanced to the OHL Finals for the first time since 2005. Hoefenmayer added 19 points (8g, 11a) in 18 playoff games and finished fourth among all OHL defensemen in playoff scoring. He has tallied 140 points (39g, 101a) in 240 career regular season OHL games and added 33 points (12g, 21a) in 33 career OHL playoff games.



**Anttoni Honka**  
Defenseman (84) / 2018-19 Team: JYP/Jukurit (Finland)  
Drafted by CAR in the third round, 83rd overall, in the 2019 NHL Draft

Honka recorded eight points (3g, 5a) in 27 Liiga games with JYP and Jukurit last season. He tallied nine points (2g, 7a) in six games with JYP U20 (Finland-Jr.) and also posted seven points (2g, 5a) in 11 regular season games with KeuPa HT (Finland-2). Honka added 11 points (3g, 8a) in 17 postseason games with KeuPa HT. Internationally, he won gold with Finland at the 2018 IIHF U18 World Championship as well as the 2019 IIHF World Junior Championship. His brother, Julius Honka, is a defenseman for the Dallas Stars.



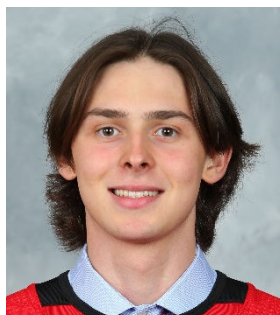
**Kameron Kielly**  
Center (67) / 2018-19 Team: University of Prince Edward Island (USports)  
Camp Invitee

Kielly registered 43 points (15g, 28a) in 30 games with the University of Prince Edward Island in 2018-19, finishing sixth among all USports skaters in points. He led his team in goals, assists and points, and he was named 2018-19 UPEI Male Athlete of the Year. Kielly has posted 85 points (28g, 57a) in 60 USports games over two seasons with the Panthers. Before that, he tallied 202 points (77g, 125a) in 306 career QMJHL regular season games over five seasons with Gatineau and Charlottetown.



**Lenni Killinen**  
Right Wing (54) / 2018-19 Team: Assat (Finland)  
Drafted by CAR in the fourth round, 104th overall, in the 2018 NHL Draft

Killinen posted 11 points (3g, 8a) in 32 Liiga games in his rookie season with Assat in 2018-19. During the 2017-18 season, he tallied 41 points in 38 games with Blues U20 (Finland-Jr.), as well as four points (2g, 2a) in 10 games with Espoo United (Finland-2). He represented Finland at the 2018 IIHF U18 World Championship, winning gold.



**Pyotr Kochetkov**  
Goaltender (90) / 2018-19 Team: HC Ryazan (Russia-2)  
Drafted by CAR in the second round, 36th overall, in the 2019 NHL Draft

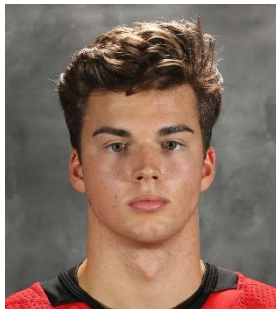
Kochetkov posted an 8-7-3 record, 2.13 goals-against average, .930 save percentage and two shutouts in 18 games with HC Ryazan (Russia-2) in 2018-19. He also played a pair of KHL games for HC Sochi last season, registering a 2.57 goals-against average and .911 save percentage. Kochetkov represented his home country at the 2019 IIHF World Junior Championship, where he won bronze and was named Top Goaltender at the tournament after posting a 4-1 record, 1.45 goals-against average and .953 save percentage in five appearances.



**Jake Kucharski**

Goaltender (40) / 2018-19 Team: Omaha (USHL)  
Drafted by CAR in the seventh round, 197th overall, in the 2018 NHL Draft

Kucharski posted a 3-4-1 record, 4.03 goals-against average and .855 save percentage in nine USHL appearances with Des Moines and Omaha in 2018-19. He has made 37 career USHL appearances, registering an 11-18-3 record, 3.74 goals-against average and .871 save percentage. He is committed to play college hockey at Providence College.



**Jack LaFontaine**

Goaltender (80) / 2018-19 Team: Penticton (BCHL)  
Drafted by CAR in the third round, 75th overall, in the 2016 NHL Draft

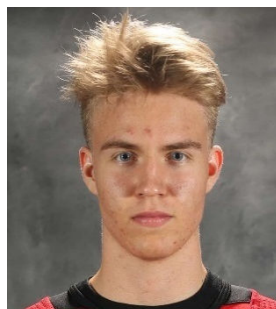
LaFontaine registered a 30-13-1 record, 2.19 goals-against average, .923 save percentage and three shutouts for Penticton last season. He finished second in the BCHL in wins, goals-against average and save percentage, and won the league's award for top goaltender. Prior to 2018-19, LaFontaine played two seasons of college hockey at Michigan, where he posted a 5-11-1 record, 3.42 goals-against average and .902 save percentage in 22 games.



**Griffin Luce**

Defenseman (73) / 2018-19 Team: Michigan (Big Ten)  
Camp Invitee

Luce skated in 35 games for Michigan in 2018-19, recording four points (1g, 3a) and a team-high 74 blocked shots. He has played 96 NCAA games over three seasons with the Wolverines, posting 10 points (3g, 7a). Prior to Michigan, Luce spent two seasons with the U.S. National Team Development Program, registering 13 points (3g, 10a) in 101 games.



**Eetu Makiniemi**

Goaltender (60) / 2018-19 Team: Kiekko-Vantaa (Finland-2)  
Drafted by CAR in the fourth round, 104th overall, in the 2017 NHL Draft

Makiniemi appeared in 13 games with Kiekko-Vantaa (Finland-2) last season, registering a 2.92 goals-against average and .905 save percentage. In the 2017-18 season, he played 35 games for Jokerit U20 (Finland-Jr.), earning a 3.03 goals-against average and .916 save percentage.



**Blake Murray**

Center (85) / 2018-19 Team: Sudbury (OHL)  
Drafted by CAR in the sixth round, 183rd overall, in the 2019 NHL Draft

Murray posted 50 points (30g, 20a) in 66 OHL games for Sudbury last season, leading the team in goals. He added five points (4g, 1a) in eight playoff games for the Wolves. Murray won 54.4% of his faceoffs in 2018-19 and his five game-winning goals were tied for the team lead. Murray has registered 94 points (51g, 43a) in 123 career OHL games over two seasons with Sudbury.



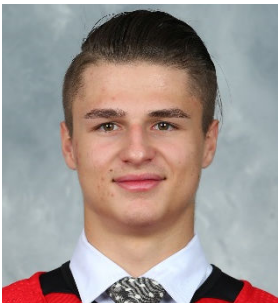
**Anthony Popovich**  
Goaltender (50) / 2018-19 Team: Guelph (OHL)  
Camp Invitee

Popovich posted a 30-13-7 record, 3.29 goals-against average, and .899 save percentage during the 2018-19 OHL regular season with Guelph. In the playoffs, he helped the Storm win their first OHL title since 2014 by registering a 16-8 record, 3.12 goals-against average, .892 save percentage and two shutouts. In his OHL regular season career, he has earned a 66-51-16 record, 3.61 goals-against average and .895 save percentage in 142 appearances.



**Patrik Puistola**  
Right Wing (32) / 2018-19 Team: Tappara U20 (Finland-Jr.)  
Drafted by CAR in the third round, 73rd overall, in the 2019 NHL Draft

Puistola registered 22 points (11g, 11a) in 25 games with Tappara U20 (Finland-Jr.) last season. He played 22 games on loan in 2018-19 with LeKi (Finland-2), recording 26 points (15g, 11a). The 6'0", 174-pound forward also made his Liiga debut with Tappara last season, posting one assist in 16 games. Puistola represented Finland at the 2018 Hlinka Gretzky Cup as well as the 2019 IIHF U18 World Championship.



**Jamieson Rees**  
Center (81) / 2018-19 Team: Sarnia (OHL)  
Drafted by CAR in the second round, 44th overall, in the 2019 NHL Draft

Rees recorded 32 points (10g, 22a) in 37 OHL games with Sarnia in 2018-19, and has posted 52 points (15g, 37a) in 83 career OHL games. He represented Canada at the 2018 Hlinka Gretzky Cup as well as the 2019 IIHF Under-18 World Championship, winning gold at the Hlinka Gretzky Cup. Rees was selected ninth overall in the 2017 OHL Priority Selection by Sarnia.



**Ryan Suzuki**  
Center (61) / 2018-19 Team: Barrie (OHL)  
Drafted by CAR in the first round, 28th overall, in the 2019 NHL Draft

Suzuki registered 75 points (25g, 50a) in 65 OHL games with the Barrie last season. He has posted 119 points (39g, 80a) in 129 career OHL games over two seasons. Suzuki served as an alternate captain for the Colts during the 2018-19 season, posting 22 multi-point games and never going more than three consecutive games without recording a point. He was selected first overall by Barrie in the 2017 OHL Priority Selection and was teammates with Hurricanes forward Andrei Svechnikov in 2017-18. He represented Canada at the 2018 Hlinka Gretzky Cup, recording eight points (1g, 7a) and winning gold, and also played for his home country at the 2019 IIHF World Under-18 Championship.



**Kevin Wall**  
Right Wing (62) / 2018-19 Team: Chilliwack (BCHL)  
Drafted by CAR in the sixth round, 181st overall, in the 2019 NHL Draft

Wall posted 64 points (31g, 33a) in 49 BCHL games for the Chilliwack Chiefs in 2018-19. He ranked eighth in the BCHL in both goals and points last season and added four points (2g, 2a) in 11 postseason games. Prior to last season, Wall played two seasons of prep school hockey at Salisbury School (Conn.). He is committed to play college hockey at Penn State.

**Cade Webber**

Defenseman (68) / 2018-19 Team: The Rivers School (Prep-MA)

Drafted by CAR in the fourth round, 99th overall, in the 2019 NHL Draft

Webber posted 26 points (12g, 14a) in 29 prep school games with The Rivers School (Mass.) last season. He also skated in seven games with the U.S. National Team Development Program in 2018-19. Webber represented the U.S. at the 2018 Hlinka Gretzky Cup, where he tallied two assists. He is committed to play the 2019-20 season with the Penticton Vees of the BCHL, and after Penticton he is committed to play college hockey at Boston University.
